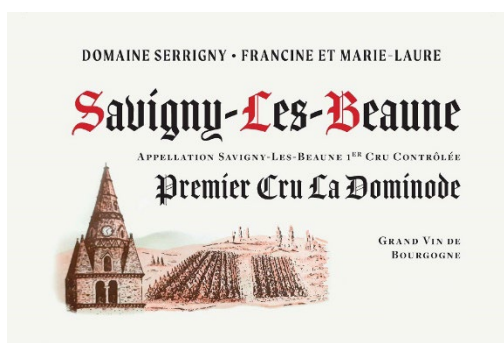


# Domaine Serrigny Savigny-les-Beaune



## Savigny-les-Beaune 1er Cru La Dominode 2019



*Serrigny's vines in la Dominode are also ancient, closing in on one hundred years of age and situated right alongside of those of Bruno Clair (though she notes that she has had to replant individual vines over the years, so that the average is probably closer to eighty years-old these days). The combination of these ancient vines and the small percentage of younger ones have produced a fine bottle in 2019, offering up a complex bouquet of red currants, black cherries, fruitcake, spit-roasted venison, a superb base of*

*minerality, cedar and a smoky topnote. On the palate the wine is deep, full-bodied, chewy and complex, with a plush core of fruit, ripe tannins and a long, complex and youthful finish. This will need some bottle age but is going to be a fine bottle in due course. 2029-2075.*

## Savigny-les-Beaune 1er Cru Les Peuillets 2019



*The domaine's vines in les Peuillets are not quite as venerable as those in la Dominode, as they were planted in 1965, but these are still good old vines. Like the la Dominode, this is ripe and more fruit-driven in personality than the 2021s here, but this is the style of the vintage. The nose wafts from the glass in a nascently complex mix of red and black cherries, sweet dark berries, Savigny spice tones, bonfire, game, a nice touch of underlying soil and cedary oak. On the palate the wine is deep, full-bodied and a touch more reserved*

*out of the blocks than the la Dominode (this premier cru has more limestone), with a superb core of fruit, ripe tannins and fine focus and grip on the long and well-balanced finish. 2031-2075.*
