Bramaterra "Gervasio" 2019

Emerging from old vines in Casa del Bosco, the 2019 Bramaterra Gervasio is a pretty typical blend of 80% Nebbiolo and 10% each Croatina and Vespolina. Dried flowers, dried herbs, mint, leather and licorice lendlovely complexity. Readers should expect a wine with a good bit of aromatic/savory complexity and a subdued fruit profile. Silky tannins wrap it all together. The 2019 spent 18 months in 22HL Slavonian oak casks.

Bramaterra "Gervasio" 2018

The 2018 version is outstanding, showing beautiful depth on both the nose and palate. The bouquet wafts from the glass in a youthful, black fruity blend of black cherries, dark berries, smoked meats, a touch of road tar, a fine base of stony soil, a dollop of fresh oregano and a topnote of bonfire. On the palate the wine is bright, full-bodied and focused, with a fine core of fruit, lovely soil signature and grip, moderate tannins (for nebbiolo!) and a long, complex and beautifully balanced finish. This needs at least a half dozen years in the cellar to soften up its backend tannins properly. Fine, fine juice and a very refreshing bottle at 12.5 percent octane. 2030-2075.

Bramaterra "Gervasio" 2017

The 2017 Bramaterra "Gervasio" from Cantina Gaggiano is composed from a cépages of eighty percent Nebbiolo and ten percent each of Vespolina and Croatina. The vines are farmed without chemical products, hand-harvested and the three varieties are generally harvested at the same time and co-fermented. Elevage is in large botti for eighteen months prior to assemblage prior to bottling. The 2017 comes in at a svelte 12.5 percent alcohol and offers up a beautifully refined bouquet of cherries, gamebird, complex soil tones, woodsmoke, brown spices and a topnote of dried roses. On the palate the wine is bright, full-bodied and tangy, with a good core, excellent transparency and grip, fine-grained tannins and a long, complex and beautifully balanced finish. This is excellent young Bramaterra! 2027-2050+.
